You Helped Raghad Find Employment During a Pandemic

Raghad is bright young woman and a friendly smile. She worked hard to earn her degree and was excelling in her career in her native Iraq.

But, because the increasing political unrest and violence put her life in danger, she made the tough decision to flee, and with what little money she was able to save took a chance at a new life in the United States.

Despite her education and experience, Raghad struggled to find work in the U.S. Her bills began to pile up, and she wondered how she would survive.

Then, because of your support, Raghad found help through Catholic Charities. She enrolled in one of our vocational training programs that helped her develop a plan to find work. She attended workshops on job readiness to learn how to write a resume, interview skills and how to network.

With so many newly unemployed people looking for work because of the COVID-19 pandemic, Raghad's struggle to find a job became even more difficult. However, thanks to your support, Catholic Charities continued to serve people in need like Raghad. Staff connected her to employers within their network and helped her prepare for interviews.

With their help, Raghad impressed employers with her experience and professionalism, and secured her first professional job in the U.S. in quality management.

You Help Bring Food and Comfort to Vulnerable Fort Bend Seniors



For Ramona, the only food she has to eat comes from deliveries to her home during the COVID-19 pandemic, made possible by gracious donors like you.

"Some days I cry." These heartbreaking words come from Ramona, one of the seniors who, because of the COVID-19 pandemic, can no longer come to the Mamie George Community Center (MGCC) in Richmond each weekday for fellowship and a nutritious meal.

Because of you, seniors like Ramona receive meals and groceries to keep them nourished as the pandemic rages through the summer heat. Volunteers deliver food, smiling and maintaining safe distance to protect this vulnerable population. For many of the seniors, these deliveries are the only food they'll have.

With your support, seniors like Ramona know that they are not truly alone, even if they can't come to the center for fitness classes and spend time with friends over a jigsaw puzzle. While the visits from the volunteers are comforting, Ramona still looks forward to the day she can return to the MGCC "I love to be at the Center. I miss that. It's killing me every day."

In addition to food and companionship, many seniors came to the MGCC to escape the summer heat. Now stuck in houses without air conditionings, they are suffering in sweltering heat. Thankfully, gracious donors like you are making sure that seniors don't have to suffer. The Center recently received a generous donation of air conditioning units for the seniors we serve.

The first unit went to a single grandmother who cares for eight grandchildren. She and the youngest child were recently hospitalized with serious health conditions. Typically, they cool their home with three air conditioning units, but all three stopped working. They are very grateful to be able to cool a portion of their home.

In just a few months, we provided more than 1.3 million pounds of food to 115,000 people through our "drive-thru" food distributions so far. More than 2,600 home deliveries to vulnerable seniors and parents of young children unable to leave their homes received food, supplies, diapers and more, thanks to your generosity.

Despite the challenges, Catholic Charities is committed to our mission as people of faith helping people in need. With your help, we will continue to extend our hand to the poor and vulnerable, and meet whatever needs arise from this crisis.

Thanks to you, the coronavirus can't stop Catholic Charities

Because you are with us during times of crisis, Catholic Charities never missed a beat in providing services when the COVID-19 pandemic first hit our community. Your support enabled us to make quick adjustments to ensure that our staff continues to serve people in need while maintaining a safe distance. Even though we can't provide a hug or a handshake, we can still reach out via phone calls, texting and e-mail to connect with low income families whose ongoing struggles are compounded by financial loss caused by the pandemic.

Catholic Charities uses technology to open the door to food and financial help through our Family Assistance Program. People who are in danger of hunger or homelessness can enter a request for rental assistance through our website, CatholicCharities.org, and find a schedule for the latest drive-through food distribution at one of our network of food pantries.

Thanks to the resources you make available to us, Catholic Charities can use web-based video-conferencing tools like Zoom to keep families informed. Our St. Frances Cabrini Center for Immigrant Legal Assistance held virtual "Know Your Rights" legal presentations, known as "charlas," in addition to maintaining an in-person presence at their offices on the North Loop.

The Blessed Beginnings Life Center holds parent education classes via Zoom, to ensure that young parents can maintain contact with others during a time when group gatherings can't be held.

With your support, Catholic Charities' Counseling and Behavioral Health Clinic uses video counseling to maintain visual contact with their clients while they're miles apart. The online Zoom-like setting allows the counselor to interact more effectively with the client by reading body language and facial expressions during the session.

Beginning in June, Catholic Charities' Mamie George Community Center (MGCC) began serving as one of the Houston Food Bank's Neighborhood Super Sites, hosting large-scale food distribution to hundreds of area low income residents who are struggling even more to keep food on the table during the COVID-19 pandemic.

This partnership enables Catholic Charities to serve 50% more families in need with up to 60 pounds of food items including non-perishables, fresh milk and produce, and frozen meats.
